Prince of Peace

The call to worship on Sunday worship during Advent begins with the words, "be with us now." What does this mean for us? First, the petitions may ask for God to be with us in our worship or our community or suffering or our healing.

Following these petitions, we sing Emmanuel, Emmanuel, Emmanuel. The words call to God to be present with us as we journey through the season of Advent.

We long for Jesus, the Prince of Peace, to make us one body and set us free from the anxieties of this world. We ask to be united in the gift of hope and become reconciled people of God as described in the Advent Candle lighting hymn.

The season of Advent is about waiting for the coming of the Lord. From the Advent Devotionals to the themes of the Sunday and midweek worship services, we wait for the coming of Christ, both from 2,000 years ago and the arrival yet to come. As the people of God, we journey towards Bethlehem in the comforting but challenging reality of the "already" and the "not yet." After all, Advent is about hope for today, and Jesus is with us in the liminal time between the already and the not yet.

Then we move into the twelve days of Christmas and Epiphany. Christmas is about celebrating the Incarnation. This year, we hear from the Gospel of John that in the beginning was the Word and how the darkness has not overcome it.

Epiphany commemorates typically the arrival of the magi who came from afar to pay homage to the Christ child. Yet, the Christ child is born to us every day, and our Epiphany is continuous. Therefore, the time after Epiphany is a perfect opportunity to receive new insights about ourselves and the God we serve. Throughout this time, we will listen to one another and hear where God is calling our congregations.

As always, Advent is a time for us to catch our breath. By that, I mean that in Advent, we become more aware of what God is doing in our lives and the world. It is a time that we can stop and breathe. Enjoy our families and friends. Take in the beauty of the decorations or the stillness of the night. Pray and worship.

Isn't this why we ask God to be with us now? What does it mean to make us one body? It is a time to prepare our hearts and minds for the coming of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

May you and your family have a blessed Advent, with all those who wait, and sing, *Come now, O Prince of peace, make us one body. Come, O Lord Jesus, reconcile your people.*¹
